This information is connected to the special needs classes you attended at the beginning of the school year. Many of you may remember Henry and the lessons he taught us when dealing with children with disabilities.



TURN "I CAN'T" INTO "I CAN"! Too many students with special needs feel like they don't measure up. The thoughts and comments of, "I'm stupid ", "I can't" & "I'm not smart enough" are painful reminders that special needs children are not being understood. When speaking with your riders, please realize that many may have an 'invisible' disability. An invisible disability is one that you cannot see when looking at a person. Although it looks like this person is developing, typically they are not. In contrast, disabilities that are easy to notice are called "visible" disabilities. Whether your route has special needs students or not, there are always children who struggle and need your support from time to time but don't always know how to ask for it. Because safety comes first on all bus rides, it's important to remember that safety also includes each rider's mental health. Establishing a positive connection with your students helps to create a positive climate on your bus for everyone.

However, it is not always easy to develop a connection with riders who have difficulty communicating. Asking openended guestions helps to build that supportive relationship and also allows riders to think about their responses. Some examples are: What was your favorite part of the day? What do you like to do during your free time? What questions do you have for me today?

While speaking and asking questions, remember to make eye contact with your rider. Keep your calm and friendly tone of voice but don't always expect the rider to look directly back at you. As the child becomes more familiar and comfortable with you, eye contact can improve over time. Building a connection is the foundation to safe and fun bus rides.
