<u>CRUCIAL STEPS AFTER AN ACCIDENT</u>: no one ever plans on having an accident. It is important to remember if you hit anything but air...call into your Dispatcher. At the scene of an accident, drivers should follow these steps-

- 1. Stop do not leave the scene of an accident. Use your hazard lights to indicate the bus is stopped.
- 2. Do not move the bus unless told to do so by a police officer.
- 3. Reassure the students.
- 4. Notify Dispatch, make your message clear and urgent.
- 5. Account for all passengers.
- 6. Document what happened, follow SSPP accident steps and use/identify Supervisor as a witness.
- 7. Do not release students. Unless evacuation is necessary, children are safer waiting on the bus.
- 8. Do not make statements at the scene. Be respectful and polite but do not place or take the blame.

<u>DANGERS OF UNSAFE LANE CHANGES</u>: Drivers who perform unsafe lane changes put everyone around them at risk. As professional drivers you need to look out for some of the most dangerous maneuvers other drivers make when changing lanes:

- Not signaling before changing lanes.
- Changing lanes without checking surrounding traffic for cars. This
 can involve not checking a rearview mirror or blind spot. Some
 drivers may take a chance and switch lanes because traffic is light.
- Crossing multiple lanes at once.
- Not staying in one's lane. Drivers can swerve or partially drift into another lane for several reasons. They may be distracted by their phones, feel sleepy, or be driving under the influence.
- Changing into the highway merge lane.
- Changing lanes in an intersection.
- Two vehicles trying to enter the same lane simultaneously.
